We have responded in a variety of ways everything from including speeding up the process of drugs, including funding, and it's just a variety of issues, that other people here don't recognize that. I mean, that's one fair question. I'm sure that's a fair question. The Secretary anticipated that there would be a lot of anxiety and a lot of anger and he understands that, but he also wanted the people here today to understand his commitment that in spite of all of that, because of how he feels deeply and personally about this issue, that he in fact, would not be silenced.
