The moderator for this event is going to be Phyllis Frye , well known attorney and activist in the transgender community, who has volunteered to come forward and help keep everybody in line. And it's going to be very interesting topic of discussion of seeing where we're at where we're going. Because basically, when we talk about hate crimes nowadays, all we really ever talk about as legislation is putting are putting gay or lesbian or transgendered or bisexual on the end of a shopping list of special of groups of people. And I think what we're going to be talking about more is education so that we don't need that list of where these troubled areas are and how we can stop them before it occurs. And also groups that are together to try and prevent those from occurring again. And it should be very informative. We're also going to have a rainbow flag display there where people can visually put down a marker saying that there have been a victim of a verbal hate crime, a physical hate crime, or in memory of someone who has been killed in a hate crime. And that's going to be on display at the community center throughout August.
