Ellen Blackman. Alan Blackman lives in San Francisco. And Alan Blackman, you certainly do know what the gay movement is all about. And this program is dedicated to you, Alan, and to all of those, like you, including

And this year was the history script where they look into the history of gay and lesbian Houston. And that had been significantly rewritten so that the only names that appeared in Houston gala has been history were Jim Owens and Jim Carrey which is kind of creative understanding of the gay and lesbian history of Houston good people, for sure. But certainly not the only names to be mentioned in remembrance of, of our progress. But, but nevermind about all this. But everybody that was there had been two previous Oh, things and heard that same script. So while we're having cookies, and Gabi ever say, Whatever happened to Fred Byers and these other people, it didn't work. So it's kind of interesting. And I say all of that to lead into, into what Gay Pride week is all about. And I don't know what your schedule is for me to do this, but can I do this shirt is this there's really only one movement. Understand. And I don't care if whether if it's Minh Nelson Mandela coming to the United States, or whether it's the Gay Lesbian Pride Week movement, or whether it's the freedom of women to choose movement, or, or whether it's the putting together the various political elements for a little strength in the Hispanic community, there's only one movement. And that movement is for just equal and fair treatment. I mean, that's the only thing going I mean, that's why blacks organized in the United States. That's why Texas, Anglo colonists and their Hispanic neighbors organized against Mexico. There's only one movement and it gets it's a flow of history. I mean, that's what Marx and Engels was talking

about. That's what George Washington and Thomas Jefferson and Adams was on. It was fair, just and equal treatment. That's Only one movement. And that movement has a continuous flow. It's just our time as gay people, gay and lesbian people to carry our share of the bat in our own interest. And if that's the only movement, there's only one opposition, and that people seeking privilege, people seeking to be better off than we are people seeking to keep us out of just fair and equal treatment, people like Jesse Helms who thinks that his freedom to oppress and demean and undermine our struggle. He thinks that's his freedom. A lot of Christian fundamentalist thinks that, for us to get fair, equal, unjust treatment, infringes upon their ability to look down on us. And so there's only one movement, and there's only one opposition. And it's all the same. And some time ago, we were wondering, as some of us maybe not out loud, but there were the conversations in the 50s, and the mid 60s, that gay people seem to be their own oppressors. It was the guilt. And we separated ourselves from one another rather than bound together, trying to find that place in the sun with with others seeking it. So what tomorrow is about and what this whole week has been about, is about bringing you to the realization and doesn't make a difference, whether you're straight or gay, or male or female, or rich or poor, bringing you the realization that gay and lesbian people are as deserving of the same things that other people expect out of society, as those other people. And to do that we have had to create an atmosphere that we call Lesbian Gay Pride Week, to bring to the attention of gay people who have been taught since the earliest recollection, to feel guilty and ashamed to bring them to the realization that they are deserving of what we politically are struggling for. And it's so wonderful. I mean, tomorrow, after the parade, which is going to be hot, and you're going to do some sweating, but the visuals are just going to be phenomenal. I mean, what you see is just going to be unbelievable is going, if you've never done this before, this is certainly going to be one of the prime experiences in your life. People crying, they laugh because of the joy of all of this and whenever you get to when you get to the tent for the community organization. Be sure and go around and meet Glenn Maxie of the Lesbian Gay rights lobby in Austin here is a very courageous young man who has for several years now been the only openly gay person daily in the Capitol Building in Texas. And right next to him is Stephen Dean from the Human Rights Campaign fund. And Steve is a real pioneer in this movement, having pioneered that organization and pioneered lobbying in Washington, some really courageous people. Also, you know, hang around and and meet Pat Gandy and the women who are active in the caucus and if you get a chance to go meet the lesbians over 40 group that's a fun Yeah, bind
