Body Positive Houston and nonprofits support organization for HIV serial positive persons has received funding of \$85,500 from Burroughs welcome the manufacturers of AZT for a public service announcement campaign. A campaign will be a multimedia program that targets those segments of the population that high risk for HIV infection, gays, blacks, Hispanics, college students in St. Louis. Two basic message is for individuals at risk to get tested for the AIDS virus and if HIV positive to see a physician for evaluation and medical intervention, they get tested now program signifies a change for the Houston gay community. Due to the legality of homosexual acts in Texas. gay groups previously have not endorsed testing because of possible discrimination. Law Section 2106 of the Texas penal code is still in effect. completely anonymous testing is available in Houston at several locations. Body Positive Houston will refer people calling in for information to one of these testing centers. Referrals will also be made for counseling services physicians and local support agencies as requested the program will continue for nine months. While the positive Houston also received funding for its peer counseling program body positive Houston for HIV positive persons. This 10 week program is in its third year. The number of participants has increased dramatically in the last 12 months at annual growth rates and the number of applicants has increased at over 150% and continued growth is protected through 1991. Body Positive Houston is privately funded volunteer organization with offices in the metropolitan multi service center on West Gray. The organization provides a buddy program, Information Services and speakers forum and related services. In addition to peer counseling, your organization will celebrate its third anniversary on July 26. According to a report in a recent edition of The New York Times, lesbians and gay men coming into the United States to attend the sixth International AIDS Conference this month in San Francisco may be refused entry because of their sexual orientation. A Times reporter obtained an internal memo sent by the US Immigration and Naturalization Service to the US Public Health Service, advising them to have qualified medical personnel available in San Francisco. To determine whether or not an incoming visitor is homosexual. There is still an immigration law in the US, which defines gays and lesbians as undesirable. A court ruling in the ninth District, which includes San Francisco, ordered that qualified medical experts rather than immigration authorities, must make the official determination of a foreign visitors sexuality. However, in a report filed by Allen Lipski, Duke Austin, a spokesman for the Immigration Service said that while the law is on the books, it really won't be enforced,

often says that since the American Psychiatric Association ruled that homosexuality is not a disease, the INS doesn't even ask if you're gay, I don't know of a single case, we've had somebody come forward and proclaim themselves a homosexual at a port of entry. But even if they did that, and every place in the United States with the exception of the ninth circuit, we would say okay, then you're inadmissible, you can apply for a waiver. And in almost all cases, we granted the waiver and allowed him to enter in the ninth circuit, where we would have one or two options that's either to further inspection or to get the certification from public health service. And then we have them in Austin says they heard that visitors to the conference, were planning to force the issue by declaring themselves gay. So the INS is making sure the conference goes smoothly. He says the whole thing is a case of media distortion. Urvashi VOD, Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force says that even if nothing is different, it just points up the need to change the law. There are a couple of bills in Congress which would eliminate this irrational and outdated exclusion. And we will do our utmost to move those bills forward in the next couple of months.

The 10 worst corporations of 1999 were listed in a recent issue of a magazine called multinational monitor at the top of the list, which also included mobile and Exxon oil companies. Nestle's and Philip Morris was Burroughs Wellcome, which is the exclusive manufacturer of the AIDS drug AZT from 1986 to 1988. profits for the London based drug company doubled, with a 70 to 80% gross profit margin for AZT according to the magazine late last year, after a fierce campaign conducted by AIDS advocates in the United States and in Britain, burroughs welcome lowered the price of AZT by about 20%. a year supply of the drug will still cost a person in the United States, more than \$8,000.

and Drug Administration has given the okay to expanded access testing of the experimental AIDS drug DDC. While clinical trials continue. A small number of additional people who can't tolerate other medications will receive the drug free from its maker Hoffman Laroche. DDC is a chemical cousin of both AZT and BDI. All three drugs stopped the replication of the AIDS virus, but people on DDC appear to suffer fewer toxic side effects, usually just painful nerve damage in their hands and feet. John James editor and publisher of AIDS treatment news in San Francisco says DDC is significantly cheaper than AZT when it enjoyed brief popularity as an underground anti AIDS Drug A few years ago, James says people bought a kilogram of DDC for less than \$25,000

And finally, several lesbian and feminist groups in Austria have initiated a campaign to highlight the situation of women in their country with the placement of posters on public transportation throughout the capital city of Vienna. slogans on the posters include power makes women strong, the present time is feminine, or doesn't exist at all. And lesbians have always existed everywhere. The public relations firm representing Vienna's mass transit system refused to allow that third poster on their trams. So the sponsors went to court judge ruled that although Austrian law prohibits publication of indecency of persons of the same sex or with animals, that the slogan simply claims a truth and does not portray homosexuality as better or more desirable than heterosexuality. The Viennese Public Transport Corporation is still refusing to install the posters with the lesbian slogan, claiming that female tram writers would feel offended because everyone would call them lesbians.
