On its original target audience, the Houston gay and lesbian community understands direction the Houston voice also expanded its coverage of the local arts and entertainment scene. He was a passionate fan of the arts, music and film and he enjoyed covering entertainment events personally writing reviews and meeting celebrities. Ted had numerous accomplishments and adventures in life. Among them. He was proud to be associated with Marys, where he worked his way up from a position of barback to bartender and finally manager. He enjoyed being part of Houston's leather community and was an active participant in numerous events. While important played at Mary's he was a member of the Sundance Cattle Company. The club honored him with a lifetime membership. Then He later moved to Dallas. He won the title of a Mr. Fall round up. He was born April 27 1957, and passed on August 20 1995. Ted will be greatly missed.
