They don't actually have huge numbers of people supporting them. What they do have are people with who make large donations. The fact of the matter is that if transgenders want to be included in equal rights amendments and hate crimes laws, we are going to need and I'm talking now at the local level, we need to start making the voice of our own. It's one of the reasons that It's Time Texas is coming back, is because after we withdrew for a while, we lost her voice in Austin. And we can't have that. So It's Time Texas has come back. But if we want right, now, another thing that we're gonna need

to do is we need to start showing up in some of the gay lesbian. Places power. Okay, by that I mean, I think for one thing, I think we need to start showing up H G. OPC. Meetings. That's good place to start. Now I'm really torn. And one thing I have

It's time in America, the law conference. Now the point that I wanted to make about this, there's a wonderful quote here, by the way from Phyllis Frey. Phyllis says, I was feeling very mellow, because I've been fighting since the late 80s For

what some people call transgender inclusion. But what I call transgender reincorporation inclusion means we're trying to get in reincorporation means we shouldn't have been thrown out in the first place. Right? Well, what it meant was that Phyllis got to sit next to the director of Log Cabin Republicans, for example, and they got to have a dialogue.
