Basically, we're in need of people. We are in very dire straits, as far as volunteers go. And all we ask for is one night a month to come out and ride to the streets, you don't have to walk the streets with us. Drive, right drive your car, you can ride with one of us, we just want to get some more people out there. To be a part of the community, we feel we do a tremendous work in being a deterrent to crime. And unfortunately, some of us feel that we've kind of done such a good job, we've made our job not necessary. And we don't want that complacency to come into being. Our biggest fear actually, is that if we go away, the trouble starts up again. And there's nothing to stop it. And we really need the support, we really need people to step forward and give us some time, you does not take any special training. It does not take any special abilities. I mean, if you saw me and figured I'm the one who's out there as a member of this organization, protecting the neighborhood, and if you saw me, you would

think My God, what are we in for, because I look out more out of shape than some of the police officers we have out in the streets. And that's kind of sad. And but what we try and do is just keep the people out, let them know that we're out there keeping an eye on the people who aren't keeping an eye out for themselves, ones who maybe had too much of a good time, who may be walking down a dark street trying to find their car in an area they haven't been before. And we try and help out. We had a couple of incidents tonight where we were helping out possible, we had a report of a possible abduction that we were we were helping get over there first before the police officers did. We had a couple people that were a couple of vehicles that were all kind of suspicious. And once they saw us, we didn't see them again. And it's a very important organization. It's one that we do not want to lose, and we need people to step up to the plate and come out and join us.
