And Austin and Ralph live in New York. But Austin is originally from South Carolina. Okay, so he's bringing Austin down for a little vacation to try to salvage their relationship to put, put things back together. And also to show Ralph where he grew up. And so the young couple learn from the older couple. And but there's a lot more to it than that. It's really, it's a very dear play. It's a lot different from anything I've done before in terms of the older characters, but it was important to me because of the lot of the messages that it has. And hopefully a lot of young people will see it and maybe have a better appreciation for some of the senior members of the gay and lesbian community. Because there are a lot of generational things like the before Stonewall people. Specifically, that's just the strongest that it talks about is gays, gays in the military. Oh, which is pretty topical. But in this case it's past tense because Earl and Ollie talk about what it was like for them in World War Two. And our logo on our poster and flyers and program is a pink triangle with a with a heart in the middle. Two hearts in the middle actually. But because there's so much history that Earl and Ollie share with Austin, one of the younger two, about what it was like for them in World War Two. So it's, it's got history. It's got comedy, it's got tenderness. Got it all.

They were sent often sent along with some gypsies, sent to some jail situation or prison situation immediately following the the war and the release of concentration camp survivors, which is a sad state when, even when the United States and all their freedom fighters got in there and yeah, and,

After all the people went through from just being in the concentration camp they were still labeled criminals.
