And I was a member of the screening committee, John Buchanan, who is a Republican, and he's going for the at large position number three of the Harris County school trustee. Democrats just did not have what we felt they just wouldn't be right. The Democrats didn't have the the knowledge, the understanding, it wasn't necessarily that the Republican was gay, friendly. But Republican was just more knowledgeable about education. And what we really wanted was somebody who was strong on education and educational, so that our kids really can learn some so that we don't have kids graduating from high school who can't locate the United States on a blind map. You know, we try to do something about saying that for the governorship, you know, contrary to a lot of people think there are a lot of gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered parents whose kids attend school. Now, in addition to that, we also have election judges. And the Harris County Democratic Party needs election judges to run elections all over the place. And you actually get paid for this, you get paid a minimum wage of \$5.15 an hour. Yeah, and what the election judge does is, you know, that's person you show up to vote, you show me your, your little voter card, and they make you sign your name, you know, on a big old book, and all that sort of stuff. And you can show your driver's license, if you don't have your, you don't have your voter ID card with you. And that could be you sitting there behind the desk, and the polls open at 7am. I was crashed out on my boyfriend on my boyfriend's couch across the street in his apartment. And he was because I was spending the summer with him. He was getting ready to start his first year at Columbia University in New York, and so I was going to spend the summer with him. Say what an interesting summer that was.

That night. I remember seeing not four or five, but maybe 10 or 12 or more, being arrested and put into paddy wagons. What the NYPD would do to us a lot of times they would tell you to cross the street and go over and sending US law and as soon as you cross the street, you get a ticket for jaywalking. The cop there We ready with a ticket for jaywalking. I mean, it was all kinds of crazy games. If you were a man dressed up as a drag queen or transgender, you had to have a minimum of three items of gender appropriate clothing on that was the law. That was an actual

law. It was totally illegal to serve alcoholic beverage to known homosexuals in any club. That was a law in the state of New York. So it was all kinds of crazy stuff going on. And I'm not sure just how it started, but I'm not sure if somebody threw One of their high heels at a cop or some say it was a coke bottle. And I've heard that was a break put somebody through a high heel, and it bounced off one of the cops head. And that's when all stuff broke loose. I mean, I was there as that actually happened to came across my my boyfriend blocked my lover woke me up told me they they're reading the Stonewall again. So we went out to watch. But then summary through the high hill. And, and there you go. And there we go. And it didn't take long for crowds to really get going real big. The funny thing is that there was two different types of lesbians that were at that at Stonewall as well. You had your politically correct lesbian who kept trying to cause her to quiet down and don't don't get the cops upset. And then you had your your diehard Bulldog. You ready, you know, ready to take on and help us fight? And so it was a grassroots effort.

It was a very radical time for both liberals and conservatives. I mean, we were quite literally butting heads. And for a whole year, I mean, there was this tension that was so thick, you could cut it with a knife in the air. Plus you take New York City. It's not like Houston is hot, it's humid, it's sticky. You have these huge tall buildings, you get maybe 10 minutes, 20 minutes of sunlight a day. And it is hot, the heat and humidity gets reflected off those buildings in the asphalt.

for folks that, okay. It was mostly oppression to stall, okay. The Stonewall Riots lasted for three days. Very first night of it, I lost a piece of my skull out there on Christmas Street.

It was a relief, to get a lot of the tension out and to let people know how we felt but it wasn't enough. We that was the first time we really realized the powerful political potential that we had as a community as a united community with one focus. And, as a matter of fact, what a lot of people don't realize is that the very first gay pride parade took place a week after Stonewall. No, I didn't know that. It took place one week after Stonewall. And it wasn't so much of a commemoration of the riots as it was a commemoration of who we were. It wasn't until a year later that commemorating the Stonewall riots, became our gay pride parade.
